Columbia County District Attorney's Office - Crime Victims' Assistance Program is seeking cell phone donations to assist victims of violent crimes. This is not a fund-raising event. Working cell phones and pre-paid minutes will be assigned to individuals to use in the immediate aftermath of being victimized.

Most non-profits use donated cell phones as part of a safety plan. Victims can use the phones for the sole purpose of calling 911. The need for a phone often goes beyond safety. Telephone numbers are needed for follow up services, notifications, medical appointments, counseling, housing, and accessing community resources.

If you have working cell phones you are no longer using, please consider donating it the Crime Victims' Program.
